

Collusion Tap Works (105 S. Howard St.; 5-min walk): Constantly rotating selection of beers all made in house with 24 draft lines and a small gastro pub. Open Mon - Thu 4 - 9 p.m.; Fri - Sat 12 - 10 p.m.; Sun 12 - 8 p.m.

Davidson Lobby Bar & Restaurant (Yorktowne Hotel): Small plates, handhelds, and entrees, as well as a selection of drinks and craft cocktails. Breakfast is available daily from 7 - 11 a.m., lunch from 11:30 a.m. - 2 p.m., and dinner from 5 - 10 p.m.

Esaan Thai Restaurant (30 N. Beaver St.; 6-min walk): Bustling BYO Thai restaurant offering homemade gelato for dessert. Open Fri 5 - 8 p.m.; Sat 3 - 8 p.m.

Graham Rooftop Lounge (Yorktowne Hotel): Craft cocktails and beer, as well as snacks, small bites, and handhelds. Open Wed - Fri 5 - 10 p.m.; Sat - Sun 12 - 10 p.m. Happy Hour Tue - Fri from 5 - 6 p.m. Accessible via elevator next to lobby reception desk.

Levant Mediterranean Cuisine (101 S. Duke St.; 3-min walk):

Experience the rich flavors of the Mediterranean with authentic dishes, fresh ingredients, and warm hospitality. Open Mon - Sat 11 a.m. - 8 p.m.

Mesa Moreira (58 W. Market St.; 5-min walk): Charming, family-owned restaurant that takes pride in showcasing the vibrant and authentic flavors of Portugal. Open Tue - Sun 11 a.m. - 10 p.m.

Rockfish Public House (110 N. George St.; 5-min walk): Industrial-chic tavern offering local seafood and American fare, plus craft brews on tap and cocktails. Open Tue - Thu 12 - 9 p.m.; Fri - Sat 12 - 10 p.m.; Sun. 12 - 8 p.m.

Roost Uncommon Kitchen (35 W. Market St.; 4-min walk): Southern inspired, scratch-made, honest food for brunch and lunch. Open Wed - Mon 8 a.m. - 2 p.m.

The Handsome Cab (106 N. George St.; 5-min walk): Relaxed haunt offering New American plates, a robust range of wine and spirits, and an upstairs gallery. Open Tue - Thu 4:30 - 9 p.m.; Fri 4:30 p.m. - 12 a.m.; Sat 10 - 12 a.m.; Sun 10 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Tutoni's Restaurant (108 N. George St.; 5-min walk): Inspired Italian cuisine with the best local produce and meats grown and raised in Central Pennsylvania. Open Mon - Sat 4 - 9 p.m.

Other Points of Interest

Downtown York offers many opportunities for shopping, sightseeing, and entertainment within easy walking distance of the Yorktowne Hotel. We recommend the following points of interest:

Agricultural and Industrial Museum (217 W. Princess St.; 12-min walk): Showcases the region's manufacturing heritage, from antique cars to a grist mill. Open Fri and Sat 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Appell Center for the Performing Arts (50 N. George St.; 4-min walk): A historic theater complex consisting of the Capitol, which was built in 1906, and the Strand, which opened in 1925. Appell's diverse arts programming includes live theatrical and musical performances as well as film screenings. See their website for a schedule of events and ticketing information.

Other Points of Interest

Bound Books (21 S. Beaver St.; 5-min walk): An independent bookstore with a curated collection of new books, houseplants, gift items, and a small cafe. Open Tue - Thu 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.; Fri - Sat 10 a.m. - 7 p.m.; Sun 11 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Central Market (34 W. Philadelphia St.; 5-min walk): York's historic downtown market, built in 1888, offers fresh produce from local farms; meat, poultry, and fish; and antiques, gifts, and collectibles. Lunch counters feature fare from local eateries. All sorts of interesting shops can be found around the perimeter of the building. Open Tue., Thu., and Sat. only, 9 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Colonial Complex (157 W. Market St.; 7-min walk): A complex of four buildings reflecting both private and public life in early York: the General Gates House, the Golden Plough Tavern, the Barnett Bobb Log Cabin, and the Colonial Court House. Tours are offered Tue - Sat at 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 3 p.m., and can be scheduled through the York County History Center website

Creative York (10 N. Beaver St.; 5-min walk): An arts organization that offers arts education, gallery experiences, and outreach programs to Downtown York and surrounding areas. Open Mon - Sat 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Goodridge Freedom Center and Underground Railroad Museum (123 E. Philadelphia St.; 4-min walk): Home of William C. Goodridge, African-American entrepreneur and Underground Railroad conductor. Open Wed and Sat 10 a.m. - 6 p.m.

History Center Museum (121 N. Pershing Ave.; 10-min walk): A recently opened museum and archive presenting interactive exhibitions that explore the history of York County. Open Tue - Sat, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Marketview Arts (37 W. Philadelphia St.; 6-min walk): Located in Downtown York's historic Market District, Marketview Arts is the hub for culture and creativity for York College in the community. Open Tue and Thu 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.; Wed and Fri 2 - 7 p.m.; Sat 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Timeline Arcade (54 W. Market St.; 4-min walk): The largest retro classic arcade in south central Pennsylvania, with almost 300 arcade and pinball machines from the 1970s -2000s. Open Sun - Thu 12 - 11 p.m.; Fri - Sat 12 p.m. - 2 a.m.

York Emporium (343 W. Market St.; a 12-min walk): York's premier used book and curiosity shop, boasting 19,000 square feet and over 250,000 titles, as well as used videos, music, antiques, militaria, comics, and "stuff." Open Wed - Thu 10 a.m. - 6 p.m.; Fri 10 a.m. - 8 p.m.; Sun 12 - 6 p.m.
